

Clampitt Farm

Muddy Hollow




Approached by a deceptively dry track in the days that I made these photographs I have experienced being here when the place does, truly live up to its interpretive name.



The ground to the right of the track which roughly heads North is not easy ground to penetrate and starts at the point of the burial ground plaque.













The gateway and few trees appear on the map as a structure of some sort.

There are piles of rubble or discarded materials that may have contributed to a structure.

Turning through 180 degrees and the first of the existing buildings that form Clampitt Farm are clearly visible.























Before entering the farm proper, note a collapsing lean-to structure, a patch of dense undergrowth (hiding?) and the first glimpse of a shippon.







The wall is constructed of well dressed stone suggesting a building rather than a field boundary.

With my back to the densely foliaged wall (page 6) and capturing the ends of the large barn and shippon the laurel is growing where the farmhouse/manor once stood.













Returning back to the start of the original track, as the easier option, a foray is made to investigate the barn/shippon that now is hidden from view (I have seen clearly several years ago). It is in remarkable condition.
